THE LOCAL PLAN & THE GREEN BELT

Message from Jenn Page, BHRS Chairman

When the current guest Editor suggested I write about the Local Plan and the Green Belt and/or thoughts on Buckhurst Hill, I have to admit my heart sunk a bit and my mind went blank. I really wanted to write about my obsession with the musical *Hair* and my experience at the last night of its 50th anniversary performance, a few weeks ago. This racked up some 36 performances I have seen over the last 40 years. I have always left the theatre feeling empowered and to this day when the curtain comes down I feel I can take on the world. No drugs needed!



Coming back down to earth in Buckhurst Hill, taking on the world means challenging proposals within the Epping Forest District Local Plan to desecrate our precious Green Belt in Powell Road; the idiotic idea of building on the car park at the bottom of Queens Road and the demolishing of perfectly good flats and businesses just beyond the railway underpass in Lower Queens Road.

The Local Plan stipulates that 87 dwellings should be built in Buckhurst Hill but homes currently being erected in the area, numbers which are not included in the Local Plan, are called **windfall** and our estimate shows that windfall building will reach the official number of houses wanted in Buckhurst Hill without building on Green Belt or disrupting people's lives.

Everyone in Buckhurst Hill will be affected by these proposals in the Plan should they be implemented and you all need to think seriously about this. Think about Buckhurst Hill as a whole and not "Oh Powell Road is several blocks away, 31 new dwellings will not affect us." "Building 41 flats over an underground car park in Queens Road we live in Loughton Way, some distance from the disruption of losing a car park during construction."

Think about what will happen to the businesses and families who live and work in Lower Queens Road, if the plan for demolition goes ahead, where will they go during the redevelopment of the site?

Think about the possible extra numbers of people coming to live in the area and the stress put upon schools, medical facilities and street parking.

The Parish Council has recently sent its response to EFDC Pre-Submission Plan and their comments are very similar to ours.

The results of the last Local Plan questionnaire are due to be published in September and immediately after that we propose to hold a public meeting for you. Attend that meeting regardless of whether you are for or against these proposals. We need to save part of the green lung around Buckhurst Hill. We need to keep Buckhurst Hill an attractive place in which to live.

The Society works hard to let you know what is happening and tries to engage you in making a decision about the future of our area. Please consider all this and *Let the Sun Shine In* in Buckhurst Hill.

PLANNING

Where did the time go since the last Newsletter. There has been the usual number of applications within Buckhurst Hill.

Starting with some good news, after extensive lobbying the new building at the rear of **74 Loughton Way** has been refused Planning Permission and is not eligible to be classed as Lawful Development. We wait to see when this building is either demolished or amended within the confines of Lawful Development.

An application was made to turn the property at 17 Palmerston Road from a house into 5 flats, we are pleased that this was refused by the Planning Officer under Delegated Powers. At 105 Rous Road an application was made for alterations to the property which included a rendered finish to the front elevation. The property was one of a pair of semi detached houses with a facing brick facade, following objections revised elevations were submitted returning the facade to brickwork. A really sensible solution to the problem.

At **1A Princes Way** we were surprised to see a double storey height basement being constructed. This had been put through without our knowledge as there had been different applications for **1 and 1A**. This situation should not be repeated as the Local Plan will limit future Basement schemes to one floor.

The application to extend **Braeside School in Palmerston Road** was refused permission by the
Councillors at a Plans South Meeting. The
application generated a lot of local objections
specifically with regard to severe parking
problems at School drop off and pick up times.

The various applications for **142 Buckhurst Way** have been mentioned in earlier Newsletters, a further application to demolish the bungalow and build a block of four flats was originally refused by Plans South but the Applicant has now lodged an Appeal. Once again a sensible decision that has been made locally is in the hands of The Planning Inspectorate.

We are supporting an attempt to get the original Station building **Locally Listed**. This is the

building that stands behind hoardings in the corner of the Lower Car park in Queens Road. It is a finely detailed example of early railway architecture.



The update on **18 Russell Road** is that the original scheme for four houses was refused, a revised scheme for three houses was similarly refused, appealed and the appeal was refused. The many objectors were delighted with the news. This was short lived and a revised scheme for three houses is with the Council. There is undiminished local objection to this revised scheme. We will let you know the outcome in the next Newsletter.

The Local Plan has been mentioned in other reports throughout this Newsletter. We all need to take a step back and consider the bigger picture. EFDC have been given no alternative but to put the Draft Local Plan forward for scrutiny, as without a Plan the government has said that it would potentially double the number of new dwellings to be provided, it would also give any future Developers pretty much open We know that the three schemes outlined for Buckhurst Hill have severe problems and we will robustly object to the schemes as currently put forward. We certainly understand the anxieties of the residents and shop tenants in the Lower Queens Road scheme and will keep pressing for this inappropriate uneconomical development to be dropped from future plans. We will continue lobbying that the required number of dwellings will easily be realised in small scale developments throughout Buckhurst Hill.

SPEED WATCH

The Parish has initiated a Community Speed Watch group. The training from Essex Police could only begin once there were enough volunteers. It was, of course, only as a result of BHRS members that this was possible!



Four roads have been chosen from the feedback received from the Neighbourhood Planning. The top four that cause concern to the people of BH are Loughton Way, Buckhurst Way, Forest Edge and Epping High Road.

On Tuesday 20th March you may have been aware of Speed Monitoring being undertaken by the Police on the High Road outside St John's C of E Primary School. The children in year 5 were also involved and this proved a remarkable way of sharing the thoughts needed by all to drive carefully.

Those driving over 40mph were stopped by the police, fined and given points immediately. Others, however, driving over 30mph were pulled over and given choices. The choices were: taking a fine and points; taking a speed awareness training course; **or**, driving into the school grounds to talk to the children who were ready with their questionnaires. During the day 18 drivers spoke to the children and faced questions such as "How will you feel if my Mummy found out you had had killed me?" and "Have you got any children you would like to have run over?" Hopefully these drivers will think about speed more carefully now!

One driver felt 47mph an acceptable speed outside a school!

An interesting point noted by the police was that it was speed coming into BH from Loughton that was the issue as opposed to Speed coming through from the centre. This could possibly be due to the hill. Perhaps a pinch point is desirable...

When reading the four road names you may, like some in the BHRS volunteer group, wonder why other roads were not chosen. If you have ideas do share them.

Sadly we do not have the children's support all the time. The only way to be able to tackle more roads is to persevere with the four and, we hope, build up the volunteer group. Memory Café was started by the Rotary Club of Leytonstone & Woodford to make life a little easier and a bit more fun for people suffering from varying degrees of memory loss caused by Dementia. People attend with their wives, husbands, partners and carers and we try to make it a fun and enjoyable time

Guests at Memory Café enjoy light refreshments, tea, coffee, biscuits and wonderful cakes, as well as live music provided by volunteers who play the electric organ, clarinet and piano accordion. The sing-alongs are important as old songs and music remain in the memory. In addition for more stimulation there are informal talks, picture quizzes, bingo with prizes and a host of table activities such as detailed colouring books, painting, and an array of musical instruments for the sing-along.

An important part of Memory Café is that it provides a safe environment where for two hours partners and carers can unwind, talk with each other, build friendships, transfer information, share troubles and ideas in a neutral atmosphere. It would be fair to say it

does as much good for the carers as it does for the guests who have Dementia. In fact we have some who attend who have sadly lost their partner but have built up friendships and this becomes a small part of their social life.

WALK TO VISIT A FRIEND


On our walk in May, we will be going from the site of the former Roebuck Hotel, to the Traveller's Friend in Woodford. I thought you might like to know a bit more about the pub. According to their website, it is 'A traditional British, family run, no nonsense pub and restaurant with heaps of history that has been lovingly restored, extended and bought into the modern world whilst retaining its wonderful character.'

The owners go on to say 'Our history is first recorded in the 1841 census as a 'beer shop' owned by a Mr Edward Mansell. This is the pub's first paper record although we are aware it is highly likely this now historic 'off licence' was selling alcohol before this date.

'In 1853 the beer shop, now owned by the brewers Larchin & Co. began to offer stables and lodging. It was not until at least four refusals of a license up to 1862 that Mr Edward Burr Cole attained his licence and is recorded in the 1871 census as a 'Licensed Victualler'. This we know is how the 'beer shop' became a 'public house'.

During the 1920s the pub was remodelled internally, much of its appearance which remains today. For a year during 2016/17 the pub was given the biggest makeover in its history, restoring many of the original features with the addition of a purpose-built function room and restaurant.

'Customers are welcomed to read in more detail our history from records taken from the Essex Records Office some of which are framed on our walls. Read about the true crimes that have been committed over the years! And why is it known as 'The Spivs'?



'According to the Oxford English dictionary, a 'Spiv' is 'A man, typically a flashy dresser, who makes a living by disreputable dealings.'

'During the Second World War it is generally acknowledged this is when the pub got its now infamous nickname. There was certainly a demand for rations, stockings, chocolate, petrol, pretty much anything and 'the spivs' were welcomed. Restored in the pub are the original 'snob screens' behind which it is said, many a deal was done! The name stuck.'



HAVE A HEART FOR A HEDGEHOG

The main threat is destruction of their natural habitat through changes in gardening and farming techniques together with land use for new houses.

HOW TO ENCOURAGE A HEDGEHOG INTO YOUR GARDEN

- 1) Leave areas of your garden wild. If possible it is good to leave that area naturally unkempt.
- 2) Scatter 2 or 3 hedgehog homes around your garden (check regularly)
- Provide hedgehogs with food and water (NOT MILK)
- 4) Avoid using slug pellets and other chemicals and they may eat it and not survive
- 5) Make ponds safe and add Lilly pads so if they fall in they can climb out again (also stairs)
- 6) Check long grass before mowing.
- 7) Add compost heaps!
